

CAIU BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The following actions were taken at the **May 24, 2018** meeting held at the Enola Office of the Capital Area Intermediate Unit.

Reports/Updates

- This month's Board Spotlight was on the BrainSTEPS program. Arlene Moll, CAIU BrainSTEPS Team Leader, provided an overview of the BrainSTEPS program, which was created to connect the medical, rehabilitation, education sectors, and families following student (K-12) acquired brain injury (ABI). BrainSTEPS consulting teams support school district teams in the development and implementation of educational plans following student ABI. In 2017, BrainSTEPS was recognized by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) as a national model for educational consultation supporting students and school teams in the development and implementation of educational supports and services following an acquired brain injury.
- Alicia McDonald, Director of Student Services, reported that approximately 140 preschool staff are participating in a professional development session today. Hill Top students will be attending an Educational Day with the Senators today. Hill Top is holding a Reading and Math-a-thon Parent Night tonight and Project Search Graduation is this evening. The CAIU Graduation Ceremony will be held on May 30 at CAIU, Enola (Susquehanna Room)
- Len Kapp, Supervisor of Operations and Transportation, reported that his staff is working on end of the year moves and changes and facility work.
- Theresa Kinsinger, Director of Organizational Services, reported that an HR Advisory Committee Meeting was held last week. One of the main topics was on new PDE emergency permit regulations. HR staff have been busy providing support in end of the year activities. The CAIU contract process has been busy as we receive approximately 3 - 4 external contracts weekly.
- Brian Griffith, Director of Curriculum Services, shared information and the results of the 2018 Math 24 Competition and State Quiz Bowl Championship.
- Dave Martin, Director of Technology, shared results from this year's Computer Fair. He also shared information on a new Antivirus Software and that we recently implemented an IT document management and collaboration solution called ITGlue, a web based application that allows the CAIU to create technical documentation.
- Daren Moran, Business Manager, reported that this is a busy time for the business office as we are entering into the budget season (May – July). His office is busy prepping for the annual audit, which will take place in September and October.
- Dr. Andria Saia, Executive Director, shared highlights from her Executive Director report. She highlighted the BrainSTEPS program. BrainSTEPS

ABIs can cause cognitive, physical, socio-emotional, and behavioral impairments that impact classroom performance and learning. Established in Pa in 2007, BrainSTEPS consulting teams support school teams in the development and implementation of educational plans following student ABI. In 2017, BrainSTEPS was recognized by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) as a national model for educational consultation supporting students and school teams in the development and implementation of educational plans following in the development and implementation of educational supports and services following an acquired brain injury.

Student Services

Pupil Services

- Based on district contract requests and resignations, there are multiple vacancies in our Pupil Services program. Positions are posted for Mental Health Worker, School Psychologist and Social Worker.
- Referrals continue to come in from districts for student placements and evaluations. Intake meetings will be held next week for the remaining three weeks of school.

Transition Programming

As we continue to review our transition planning and how it relates to student progress and IEP goals, a team of professionals and paraprofessionals will be meeting this summer to work on curriculum aligned to standards and transition policy to be rolled out in the 2018-2019 school year.

Professional Development

Our Summer Academy trainings are close to capacity. These trainings include topics such as diversity, student social skills, suicide prevention, play therapy, reading interventions, transition, goal setting/rubrics and grief counseling.

Equitable Participation

Meg Taylor-Makuch, Coordinator of Equitable Participation and Educational Consultant, was recently trained as a trainer in Dr. Michael Heggerty's Phonemic Awareness Curriculum. The two best predictors of early reading success are alphabet recognition and phonemic awareness, and this curriculum is used in preschool, kindergarten, and first grade as a whole class lesson. Intervention groups can use Heggerty curriculum starting in 2nd grade. Meg is currently implementing Heggerty in several non-public schools.

Hill Top Academy

- The Mobile Dentist was on-site at Hill Top for a second time this year on May 17. The dentist saw 29 students for anything from routine cleanings to cavity fillings. Between the two visits, the dentist will have seen 60 students at Hill Top this year. All services are provided to students at no cost to their families.
- Two seniors, who attend Hill Top Academy, were recognized at the Buskey Awards on May 17, for their progress and achievements as they work toward their post-secondary lives.
- Last day for students is Friday, June 1.

Student Services Events

Optimist Olympics -The 25th Annual Optimist Olympics, for deaf/hard of hearing and blind/visually impaired students, was held on Friday May 12 at the York City Ice Arena. The event is coordinated by the Optimist Clubs of York, Adams, and Lancaster counties and representatives from Capital Area Intermediate Unit and Lincoln Intermediate Unit, including our own Mary Daubenspeck and Deb Genet. It is a wonderful opportunity for our students with sensory impairments to interact, socialize, and participate in a variety of sports activities that are modified for them, including guide ropes for running, sound-producing sports equipment, Braille and large print certificates, and sign

language interpreters. Many of our Capital Area Intermediate Unit students and teachers attended this successful event.

DHH Awards - The Annual CAIU Deaf and Hard of Hearing Awards program was held on Thursday, May 17. This event gives all of the students, teachers, and families an opportunity to be recognized for all of their hard work and success. In addition, all graduates and retirees are acknowledged. The evening also features a basket raffle, a summary video of events from throughout the year, but perhaps the most enjoyable part is that each teacher stands and recognizes students for specific achievements that were made throughout the year.

Assistive Technology Conference

TECHNOLOGY SERVICES

Technology Solution - ITGlue Documentation

The CAIU Technology Services Team implemented an IT document management and collaboration solution called ITGlue. ITGlue is a web based application that allows the CAIU to create technical documentation, to include (but not limited to) network designs, process management, passwords, and documentation in one seamless experience. The CAIU partnered with ITGlue to offer an IT documentation software to our school districts called MYGlue.

Technology Solution – FortiClient Antivirus Software

The CAIU Technology Services Team has been working with school districts to evaluate different antivirus software. After completing a proof of concept with several solutions, the consortium chose Fortinet FortiClient Endpoint Security Suite (FortiClient EMS). With today's sophisticated cyber threats (targeted attacks, socially engineered phishing, malware, etc.) and the increase of devices on your network, it is important to have a current enterprise class solution to protect the data and devices. This solution ties in to our cyber security planning and integrates with our Fortinet Next Generation Firewall protection.
